

Published by Penguin, this series explores the extraordinary life of many influential people such as Nelson Mandela, Serena Willaims, Rosa Parks, Mary Seacole, Katherine Johnson and many more.



Crongton Knights (12+) Alex Wheatle

McKay's life on the South Crongton Estate is rough. His Mum has died, his Dad works all hours of the day to keep away the Bailiffs, and his brother is always out looking for trouble. McKay never looks for trouble, but in one mad night everything changes.



This Book is Anti-Racist (10+) Tiffany Jewell

Often using personal anecdotes about her own schooling, family and experiences as a young mixed race girl, Jewell's fascinating, friendly and hugely relatable guide is essential reading for kids with questions about racism, politics and history as well as the current #blacklivesmatter movement.



The Crossover (10+) Kwame Alexander

Josh and JB are basketball legends at their school. They also happen to be identical twins, but it's easy to tell them apart if you know how to look. As the boys build up the most important matches of their lives, tensions grow between them.



Grown: The Black Girls' Guide to Glowing Up Melissa Cummings-Quarry (14+)

Being a teenager and trying to understand who you are and what you stand for is hard. But if you're a Black girl and don't always see yourself represented in the books you read, the films you watch, the adverts you see or the history you're taught, it can be even tougher.

As part of this we are looking to increase the opportunities for physical exercise around the academy, develop our support for mental health and are working towards increasing the healthy food option offered in the academy.


As part of our making BBA healthier we are in the process of recruiting a student healthy schools council to specifically focus on health within the academy.

Danny the Champion of the World by Roald Dahl.


Danny had to show real resilience, overcoming some significant challenges in the book. He also gained a great understanding of different people's moral code and had an adventure along the way.

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

Assemblies and lunchtime popups

We are striving to ensure all Year 11 students at BBA know what opportunities are out there. So far we have welcomed colleagues from St Brendans, CLF Post 16, Bristol Rovers, Bristol City and Boomsatsuma. As we continue through the school year we will ensure we get more providers in to inform our students.

Post 16 deadlines.

Most providers will not specify a hard deadline for applications, but certain courses can fill up quick. I always advise that students apply sooner rather than later. I feel that applying before the end of the year or early January is advisable. This ensures that they are on the earlier interview rotations.

Your child will get updated predicted grades on 9th December, these grades will be used by most to apply. There are some providers that close before this date, please use Year 10 results from the grade range given in July. You can update their admissions with latest predictions by email or at the interview.

Applications usually go live the day after the first open event takes place. Always check the providers website for entry requirements and application criteria.
