When I was at school my favourite book was...





My name is Ruth and I'm your trainee Education Mental Health Practitioner (EMHP) working as part of the new Bristol Mental Health Support Team (MHST). Part of my role is to doing 1:1 work supporting young people with any emerging mental health issues such as anxiety, OCD, phobias and low mood. The other part of my role is to work with the wider school community on a 'whole school approach' to mental health and wellbeing. I'm in BBA every Wednesday and looking forward to thinking with everyone about to how to best support Mental Health and Wellbeing at BBA, especially after such a challenging few years.



Top-Tips for looking after your mental health and well-being this winter:





- Embrace the winter as much as you can it's a time for resting and recovering. Listen to what your body needs and show yourself compassion if your energy is low.
- Ask for what you need -the Christmas period can feel different for everyone, for some it can be over-whelming and you might need some space, for others it might feel lonely, and you might need more connection. Check-in with what you need this holiday and reach out for support if you need it.

If you feel in crises this winter and need support - look up Kooth, Samaritans or Young Minds for support.










Year 10 trip to PWC Bristol

On Wednesday 8th December, we took 50 of the Year 10 Business Studies students to spend a day with staff at PWC. We had a fantastic day and would like to thank PWC for putting on this event.

The students worked in groups over the course of the day to work on a pre-planned scenario before presenting their findings and recommendations to the rest of the audience of 60. The students were able to talk to the staff, work alongside them and ask any questions about careers in the financial sector.

The presentations were fantastic and the students did themselves proud during their moment in the boardroom. They also developed and demonstrated some key transferable skills throughout the day including teamwork, communication, presenting and confidence building. These skills will set them in good stead as they embark on GCSEs and prepare for when they move onto Post 16 education, apprenticeships and beyond.
