



I am writing to inform you about my attendance at a recent event held by the Bristol City Youth Council on 4th





Brunel Academy. The event centred around improving our society and addressed several key topics that are highly relevant to our community and school.

Summary of Discussions:

Community Infrastructure Improvements:

Suggestions were made for increasing the number of sports centres, parks, sitting spaces, zebra crossings near schools, filling of port holes and more traffic lights.

It was noted that our school already contributes to road safety by assisting students in crossing the road after school hours.

Women's Safety:

Concerns about women's safety due to gang activities were highlighted.

It was recommended as youths we should take care of ourselves by going home early before it's dark and make sure we're not alone in an environment you don't know.

Knife Crime:

The alarming rise in knife crime was discussed, with efforts underway to find solutions.

Emphasis was placed on the importance of youths listening to parents and teachers to stay safe. The council aim to provide more bleed kits in schools and give more information to students about using a bleed kits.

BBA was celebrated for raising awareness of bleed kits and their location in and around the academy. BBA is encouraged to inform children on how to use a bleed kit when needed and why we use it as there are some children in the academy without this knowledge.

Online Bullying:

Cyberbullying was identified as a significant issue in schools.

Our school's no-phone policy was recognized as a proactive measure to minimize this problem, especially compared to schools that allow phone usage.

Safety at School and Home:

Discussions explored feelings of safety at school and at home.

Our school's peer mentor program was commended for providing students with a safe avenue to address bullying concerns to their peers. BBA was also acknowledged for good practice by tell parents and career's how to improve some safety measures to make the children feel safe at home.

Financial Accessibility and Opportunities:

The high cost of living was a major concern, with suggestions to reduce prices and offer more free sports activities.

Our school was acknowledged for offering free enrichment clubs, which ensure all students can participate in extracurricular activities regardless of financial constraints.

This event was an insightful experience, showcasing the efforts of various organisations to address societal issues while also highlighting areas where Bristol Brunel Academy is already making significant contributions. I was proud to represent our school and share our initiatives, which align with many of the solutions proposed during the event.

Thank you for the continued support that allows students like me to engage in opportunities that contribute to our personal growth and our school's reputation.

Fundraising News

Throughout November, male colleagues at Bristol Brunel Academy (BBA) embraced Movember, growing moustaches to shine a spotlight on men's health issues, including testicular cancer, prostate cancer, and mental health.

This year, mental health took centre stage, as the BBA community honoured the memory of their late colleague, Ashley Jackson, by working to raise awareness and spark meaningful conversations.

At the end of Movember, staff staged a pop-up lesson for students that addressed mental health in men. As part of this, students watched a video emphasising the importance of talking. The video was hard hitting but had a very positive spin.



Parents and carers were also given the opportunity to view the video in advance, ensuring transparency and preparation for discussions at home.

Recognising the sensitivity of the topic, Year Teams at BBA provided additional support to students who may have found the material challenging. The lesson extended beyond the video, teaching students how to recognise signs of someone struggling and equipping them with practical tools to check in on friends and loved ones.

Staff at BBA sold 250 fake moustaches and could have sold double that amount. Students wore these throughout the day on Friday 29th November in support of Movember. Early estimates indicate that the initiative raised over £120, with all proceeds going to Off The Record, a local charity that supports mental health initiatives and was also supported by BBA last year.

James Ferguson, Associate Assistant Principal at Bristol Brunel Academy, said, "Movember is about more than moustaches, it's about starting conversations that save lives. This year's focus on mental health allowed us to engage students, parents, and staff in meaningful ways, promoting understanding and action."

"We are incredibly proud of the entire BBA community for coming together to raise awareness and support such an important cause."

People light oil lamps and candles on the day to symbolise the triumph of light over darkness and good over evil


This year, Diwali was celebrated on a Thursday, but some parts of the country observed the festival on Friday.

BRISTOL BRUNEL ACADEMY TOTALLY ROCK IN NATIONAL TIMES TABLES COMPETITION.

The pupils and teaching staff at Bristol Brunel Academy are incredibly excited to announce that they performed well above average in England Rocks - a times tables competition run by the internationally renowned, award-winning app and learning platform, Times Tables Rock Stars.

England Rocks required children to correctly answer as many multiplication and division questions as possible, to give their class and school the best chance of winning.



The competition was fierce with 201,588,705 questions answered collectively by 384,658 pupils from more than 4,543 schools and 30,188 classes around the country!

Our school stats were astonishing too. BBA came in 1654th place across the whole country. On average our top class answered 356 questions correctly per pupil, with the best performing pupil answering an amazing 6,929 questions correctly in total. I am sure you can appreciate that those stats are out of this world!

Mrs Shaw says "I am so impressed by how many correct answers we managed to get in such a short period of time. We were very high in the overall table, which is a massive achievement given that our students took part as a homework task rather than in lesson time. Well done to everyone who took part!"

Enrichment—GCHQ NLC

On the week commencing 15th November, groups of Year 9 students from BBA took part in the GCHQ National Languages Competition.

GCHQ is the UK's intelligence, security and cyber agency. Their mission is to keep the country safe. GCHQ highly values language skills, so each year it runs the National Language Competition. This is



a virtual competition where teams from schools around the UK compete against each other to solve language-based puzzles and score points.

This was the second year that BBA students took part. The MFL department was so pleased with the dedication that the students demonstrated, giving up their own time after school to compete and develop their resilience and employability skills. All the challenges were incredibly difficult, requiring teams to work together and think outside the box.

All of the evidence that informs our literacy practice supports the importance of regular opportunities to read throughout the day.

Our tutors in Year 7, 8 and 9 will share one book and the tutor will read aloud to their students. This will happen twice a week and is part of our tutor programme.

We would welcome your feedback and ideas for future fantastic books for our KS3 children.



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
Year 10 Engineering
