

There was also a book marathon where a lot of students stayed after school to read. The marathon was for charity and students asked people to sponsor reading, which meant that a lot of money was raised.


You may have also seen some of the staff dressed up as book characters on world book day. A lot of students went around with the quiz about their costumes. We are waiting to find out who won.

Further assemblies are planned for Term 5.



There were dissections at lunchtime. Mr. Smerdon is dissecting a squid and showing the students how the pen or gladius can be removed and used to write using squid ink.



After last year's World Book Day, where all celebrations took part remotely and during lockdown, I was delighted to be back in school celebrating this event. This year was the 25th Anniversary of WBD, and I was thrilled with the energy, enthusiasm, and generosity of BBA students who made the event incredibly special.

We organised a book amnesty. Over 700 books were donated by students and with staff donations the total was close to 1000. These books were then on sale during the week of World Book Day. Books were on sale for between 20p and 50p and we managed to raise a massive £160 for Book Aid International,

the charity chosen democratically by students in their tutor groups. The book sale created a real buzz across the week, and it was great to see so many books changed hands. We were also able to donate some of the remaining books to Summerhill Academy to help them fill their new library. A huge well done to all the student leaders who helped organise and manage the book sale!



Together we read over 1200 pages, raised over £400 and drank what felt like 300 cups of hot chocolate!

Thank you to all BBA students and families for taking part and making the celebrations special. A special thanks too to our librarian Mrs Watkins for her amazing work.











Careers & Post 16

Year 9 Raising Aspirations day

Year 9 students at BBA joined others across CLF to participate in a raising aspirations day. The day was a fantastic opportunity to hear from key note speakers, Post 16 and 18 providers as well as a range of employers from a range of sectors.

Throughout the day we also created a bespoke package for BBA students focusing on identifying key employability skills that the students may already have. Starting to look at how to write a CV and a session on LMI (labour market information).

The LMI sessions were particularly useful to students from the feedback. This allowed the students to understand how labour market information can be used to help them make informed decisions about their career goals and aspirations.

PWC Business trip

BBA continued their relationship with PWC in Bristol by taking 30 students that expressed an interest in studying Business

Studies in year 10. This visit gave the students an insight into the boardroom in a multi-million pound company, learn about various roles within the sector and attempt their own business plan and pitch.

All students were fantastic throughout the day. The presentations were amazing and they came up with some fantastic ideas for their office vending machine company. I was particularly impressed considering that for most stuents this was their first experience of presenting and how some students were required to step outside of their comfort zone to participate. We would like to thank PWC for their continued work with the school and

giving the students the opportunity to spend a day in the life of an employee.

Year 10 Work Experience - 6th to 10th June

Work experience forms should be in by the end of this term to allow us the time to ensure that the placement is suitable and we follow the HSE guidelines. If your child has a form or placement that they have organised but not notified us, I urge them to get the form back to reception ASAP. For those students who will still be on site we will be running a programme to give the students some insight by linking their curriculum areas with industry specialists.





Careers & Post 16

Lunch time pop ups

Over the course of the year we have invited in several companies and education providers. I would like to encourage students of all year groups to stop by and have a conversation to find out about their organisation. It is never too early to start thinking about the future careers.

We had WSP come in during National Careers Week and it was fantastic to see the engagement from our students from Year 7-11 who stopped to find out some more about careers in the engineering sector and particularly the different types of engineering.

I will continue to invite these organisations in and offer a wide range of sectors to ensure that the students at BBA can learn more about their options moving forward.


