27-29/2/24 Engineers without borders.

Over three days we welcomed 3 sets of 4 Bristol University students who are part of the 'Engineers Without Borders' club at Bristol University.

They ran a wind turbine workshop for each of our Y10 Engineering classes.





They first introduced themselves and talked about their schooling experiences (most were first educated in other countries and then came to the UK as children.)

They then talked about energy, where it comes from and how it is transported.

Finally they introduced the wind turbine that was designed and built by a 14 year old in Africa to supply electricity to his village. Students made their own wind turbines in teams and each was tested on a spindle using a hair dryer as 'the wind'.


Students were fully engaged and loved the workshop. Many asked the students questions about university life and courses.

Year 9 had sessions provided by MoSAIC run by our ex-colleague Mr Campbell and looked at the interactions between art and astrophysics.




In addition, during lunchtimes students could book into watch dissections of a variety of organisms and structures including a squid , rat, brain, skull and heart.





School Council

On Tuesday 12th March, we were given the opportunity to represent BBA at the West of England School's Summit. We spent the day interacting with other schools, learning about future developments within our local community and discussing important social issues within the area.

The aim was to empower youth voices and to invite us to share our ambitions for our future, lending us a space to express our worries, concerns and hopes for later life.

As part of our ambitions for the future, we presented a pitch to the Metro Mayor—Dan Norris—discussing social issues, specifically concerning young people within our area. Our pitch detailed the lack of facilities and support for young people in East Bristol and we urged the Metro Mayor to invest in areas for youth. We believe that youth clubs would help young people, such as ourselves feel more involved within our community, enabling us to build positive relationships and together, pave the way to a safer, more supported, positive future.

We believe everything starts with young people, so we need to invest in youth before it is too late.

We also listened to pitches from other schools highlighting knife crime, the importance of student voice, plastic waste from school canteens and period poverty.

Overall the day proved an invaluable opportunity to contribute positively to the future of youth in East Bristol. We felt that even though we are not able to vote yet our voice was heard.

School Council



For the second CLF Pupil Parliament, Ella Burley (standing in for Anna Osborne) and Sam Murray attended an online meeting (8th March) focusing on the new target points to discuss and work on with the rest of the School Council.

During the meeting, the chair, Suzie Weaver expressed how important student voice is to the CLF. She discussed the three aspects of a wider, overall commitment to student voice; Pupil Parliament— Trust wide, Student Advocate—School Council and Pupil participation— Academy approach. She shared this model:

As part of the meeting, students from Frome Vale Academy shared with the pupil parliament their new rewards initiative, where rewards are given to students who help staff. This includes the system of rewarding points to earn their own currency (the penguin pound) which could be used by the students to buy them a small gift. We liked this idea, however we didn't feel it was suitable for a secondary school. Nevertheless it has got us thinking about the BBA reward system. This is something we will be following us as the School Council with Mr Saunders.

Furthermore, Suzie Weaver revealed to us the recent meeting of Kerry McCarthy and the CEO of CLF schools. This was an unexpected visit so there was little time left for preparation, so no questions were asked on behalf of students which is incredibly disappointing. Due to this, next meeting's main objective is to create questions for any other unexpected visits from local political leaders. The School Council we be sending out a form for students to submit questions they would like to raise on their behalf.

It is frustrating that we still need to deliver on the environmental aims that were mentioned during the last Pupil Parliament but with our Eco Team representative leaving this is proving hard.

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How to manage exam stress


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Stress levels can be higher than usual around exam time. A bit of stress can help us to stay motivated but too much can be unhelpful. This webinar will help you to

Eco-Club

Lush Product Review:

As a part of Eco Club, we have been researching Lush products. Lush is a cosmetic company that provides eco-friendly products. They have been a company since 1995, made by the people Constantine and Weir. The cosmetics that they sold were made of fresh fruits and vegetables. 18 students and teachers gave a review of the products given by Eco Club. The statistics are as follows:

The average rating for people who liked the scent was 4/5

The average rating for people who thought that the products suited their hair/ skin types was 4.3/ 5

The average rating for people who found the products easy to use was 4.3/5

The average rating for its practicality was 4/5

The average rating for people who would recommend this brand's products was 4/5

Most people had no trouble storing the soaps, but some did have trouble. One example of this is people not being able to store it easily due to it disintegrating. Everybody was very satisfied with the scent of the product. It was an overwhelming favourite in the survey, with 16/18 survey takers saying it is its best quality.
