
When I was at school my favourite book was...




Favourite Childhood Book: The Hobbit, by JRR Tolkien

I have always been fascinated by fantastical lands and mythical beasts (which this story has), but what really gripped me about this book was how a vulnerable and anxious person overcame great obstacles to help achieve glory. Along the way there are a number of wild and wonderful characters, including the wise and powerful Gandalf to the now infamous Gollum. This is a prequal to *The Lord of the Rings*, a book I would go on to love as an adult, but *The Hobbit* is where the story really begins, and is much more accessible to children - firstly as a brilliant adventure story, but also as a way into Tolkien's epic world.



Anna Shaw - Drama

My favourite childhood book was 'Tom's Midnight Garden' by Philippa Pearce. It's a beautiful novel about memory, friendship and growing up. As a child, I wished I could wake up to find a magical garden where my own, very ordinary garden, once was and I dreamt of skating down the frozen river to Ely with Tom and Hatty. I have re-read this book many times since I was a child, and, like all the best books, it says something different to me every time. It's a truly remarkable book.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

Q. When do applications close?

A. Each provider is different so please check websites. North Bristol P16, Colston V6 and St Mary Redcliffe sixth form have closed applications but may accept late application. BCCS closes on 5th January. Please contact the provider to discuss. Most providers will continue to accept applications throughout year 11 but some provides will treat these as late applications and your child may not get their first choice preference.

Q. Can I apply for more than one provider?

A. Yes, you can certainly apply and I recommend having a plan B. If you want to apply for different courses at the same provider I advice contacting them rather than submitting several applications.

Q. Will there be Apprenticeships available?

A. Yes, however Covid 19 has and will continue to have an impact. Use the official government website to search opportunities in your area.

Q. I am still unsure about what to do. What do you advise?

- A. Book an appointment with Mr Jordan
- Explore providers listed on the school careers page of the BBA website.
- Use <u>Careers Pilot</u> to give you ideas of opportunities, careers information and up to date labour market information.

Year 10 Careers Inspiration Day



More important than any one sign is the feeling that something is not right. Friends and family are often the first to spot worrying changes taking place. actearly.uk


The launch of the new Counter Terrorism website 'Act Early'. https://actearly.uk/




This is particularly relevant in this current climate with the impact of Covid 19, social isolation and the rise in hateful extremism online.


