Year 10 Engineering - Airbus

This term, we hosted 12 Airbus Engineers who ran workshops for us on wing design. They first introduced Airbus as a company, then talked about careers in Airbus and routes into the company which included apprenticeships, degree apprenticeships and graduate schemes. Next they explained how aircraft wings are designed and tested. Students spilt into groups of 4 and were asked to design and build their own wings. They were then tested by the Airbus Engineers using a test rig with different masses applied. Students thoroughly enjoyed the sessions and were fully engaged.





BBA Visit to Paris, September 2024


Year 9 have made a fantastic start to the year working on their food themed projects. Some beautiful work here, a mix of pencil drawing and watercolour painting.

















Year 9



One year ends and another year begins! We started the year by reviewing the presentations of the students completing the silver awards. There were some very engaging, educational and occasionally embarrassing (for the staff) videos produced with some high level production skills on show.

The process of enrolling Year 9 students onto the bronze award has now been completed. This has proved a challenge as the course was oversubscribed by almost 100% with 90 applications for 50 places. We have no doubt there will be some very disappointed individuals.
