Lukas meant there was strength in every scene. Excellent comedic turns given by Ella, Leia and Felix added to this strength making this performance one to remember




It only remains to thank all those volunteers, students and staff behind the scenes in the band and the technical area for making the running flow effortlessly.

Science Week 2025

National Science Week was celebrated from the 10th-14th March.

As ever, the Science Department had a variety of activities for the students to engage with.

As part of Science Week, Mr Campbell from Mosaic came into school to deliver sessions to all our Year 7 classes about art in astronomy. He started by introducing different scientists from very diverse backgrounds and how they started working in science and what they achieved. He then explained the crossover between science and art before showing different images of space. Students then had to guess whether they were created by an artist or photographed through a telescope or via a satellite.



As part of Science Week, Year 8s undertook a CSI investigation in to a

crime scene. The students dressed up, explored the crime scene and took photographs whilst collecting evidence. Analysis of the evidence was then carried out back in the labs. Analysis included shoe prints, DNA, hair and (fake) drug samples for testing.

This term we had a great discussion on sustainability. We discussed how we can increase renewable energy production in our schools and how some schools in the CLF are already producing their own renewable energy. BBA is the largest non Post-16 school in Bristol. We have a large roof and large parking space. We suggested that if we cover the roofs and the parking spaces with solar panels on top, we could produce our own energy at a large scale with 0 carbon emissions. A senior member of CLF trust said that they would investigate the matter and would like to work with us to make BBA more environmentally friendly. However, he also told us that BBA ranked quite highly amongst the other CLF schools for sustainability and therefore other schools would have to be prioritised first. For now it is really important that we all do our bit for the environment, reduce our paper use, walk or cycle to school and recycle our waste.
